

Fight The gods: Part Q&A



After each series we pause and answer your questions, as we do not just preach to you, we have a Q&A to clarify and answer any burning question you have. For this series, I received about four questions from you, and it seems that the topic of Jezebel ruffled a lot of people; remember, the seed of Jezebel stems from endured rejection. Today, I'd like to dive into your questions organically and we're going to break them down together. I will display verses that I believe are important, but we shall see.

Why Aren't You Asking Questions?

If you are not asking questions at the end of a series, it makes me wonder whether you are grasping the concepts that I am preaching on, because I would have questions myself! Because if God says something while I am preaching, I must go back home and ask the Lord if I need to work on something that He brought to my attention.

Question #1:

What is the best way to engage/handle/pray and intercede for someone who appears to have the spirit of Jezebel or Ahab? In on sermon you mentioned how draining it can be trying to reach them, especially Jezebel because the spirit does not deal well with confrontation.

Recap:

How do I engage, handle, and intercede for someone who appears to have the spirit of Jezebel or Ahab?

- Now, to summarize, you can't really have a Jezebel unless there is a willing spirit to accept Jezebel. Jezebel works with an Ahab because Ahab is passive, therefore, Jezebel must be dominating.
- But Jezebel an Ahab because Ahab must be in a position where she's trying to prove that she has the position.
- So, Jezebel, who can be either male or female, needs a person in a position of power to thrive. Therefore, this person is asking how do we handle that spirit? I believe they are speaking more about Jezebel because they accuse me of saying, "in one of your sermons, you mentioned how draining it can be to reach them, especially Jezebel because the spirit does not do well with confrontation."
 - As I'm reading this, I see a couple of things; remember, these questions are all anonymous—so I don't know who wrote this question. However, it states, in one of your sermons you keep writing and mentioning, "trying to reach them? Or how do I engage and handle?"
 - So, the problem with the spirit of Jezebel is that by the time Jezebel has taken over a territory you are no longer in control. At this point I'm wondering what your relationship is with this person.
 - O I'm assuming this person who wrote this, is not talking about themselves, but they're talking about someone else they think has the spirit of Jezebel. The problem with the spirit of Jezebel as I've shown you in Revelations chapter 2, that spirit will tell you what to do, therefore, by the time you wake up, you're no longer in control.
 - Truthfully, the person is handling you; engaging you, and incanting for you [we can't say praying]; the way the Bible speaks about the spirit of Jezebel, its always aggressive.
 - o It's not like the person with the spirit of lies where you're like, "hey, brother, you do lie a lot; let's change that and let's tell the truth." This is not the kind of spirit that the only time you receive a lie is when the person opens its mouth; this is a spirit that goes to the foundation of everything that you're doing,
 - It's one of those things that by the time you realize its Jezebel, its already competing for your position and your seat. Let's discuss how God told the church to deal with her, and then we'll go through some practicality.

Revelation 2:21-23

He says, "I gave her time to repent, but she does not want to turn away from her immorality."

- God is speaking about a church that was good; remember, the Bible says that your future work is getting better than what you use to do, and this is a church that knew the Spirit of God.
- And God appears to them and tells them that they have tolerated this [a woman in the church], who has the spirit of Jezebel; and He begins telling them this by stating, "I have given her time to repent."

• What Does It Look Like When God Give you Time to Repent?

- Because, if you read that verse, you'll see that it wasn't the church that told her to repent, the Bible says that they entertained her. So, if God was the one giving her time to repent, that means God himself was trying to engage this individual; God chastises who He loves.
